Rector Reflection

As a boy, I was extremely fearful of a creature I heard about, and never wanted to face, the red skeleton. I heard the name and just knew, that I did not want to see him, or it, ever. My grandmother and older brother talked about this being coming on the television, and no matter how much they tried to comfort me, or explain their reasoning, I refused. Nope, no red skeletons for me, that was just too frightening.

The church season of Lent, though a dark church season, is not one to be feared. Lent comes from a word in "ye olde English" which meant "spring season." As other writers point out, this season as "church" one, invites us to do some Spring Cleaning. Lent is that time where we empty ourselves of everything that makes us "us," and clear out some of that which gets in our way of connecting to God.

The Season before Easter invites us to intentionally follow Jesus on his walk to the cross. And though his path is filled with pain and suffering, we do not have to go to those depths. Instead, our religious practice offers us the opportunity for a Lenten Discipline; reading scripture, prayer, commit to worship, a class, and so much more. Some people deny themselves a favorite treat, or take on a task, and whatever you choose, it can help to diminish you serving your own needs and replacing that time with God time. My hope is that all of us embark on a Holy Lent, and I am here to help you find a way to do so that works with your life, so that this Lent is a meaningful one.

Meaningful to me as a boy, was the lesson that I could, by not listening to others, whip up my own fears. As the reader may have figured out already, this crimson "being" of which I was afraid, was not a skeletal figure, or a movie monster. My grandmother and older brother actually invited me to watch a television show, featuring a comedian, Red Skelton, because they found him funny, and so, they thought, would I. Alas, I let my way of hearing the name dissuade me from enjoying some meaningful family time. In summary, Lent is an opportunity to put down a part of "us" and make room for God as we follow Christ on his intentional journey.

It has been a pretty quiet winter for the Buildings and Grounds Committee. We completed the first annual inspection of the rectory to identify any repairs that need to be made for general upkeep. A big thank you to Mr. Dave Hudson and Mr. Donnie Morgan who took the time to go through the rectory from the attic to the basement. Overall, the rectory is in great shape with just a few minor repairs needed. Dave and Donnie were joined by Mr. Bob Donaldson in early February to complete the majority of those projects, so when you see them give them a big thank you for volunteering their time!

As discussed at the Annual Parish Meeting, the biggest upcoming project for buildings and grounds maintenance in 2024 will be the start of our project to replace the protective coverings over the stained-glass windows in the church. Our Treasurer and the finance committee have been hard at work to raise the funds to complete the project, but there is still room for donations for all who are interested in donating to the project. Spring is in the air, and as we all know that means new growth! We've scheduled our spring workday for March 23rd with a backup day of March 30th if we get rained out on the 23rd. We plan to focus our efforts on the church yard and cemetery, but if we have enough volunteers show up, we will be able to get some work done in the parish hall yard also. I will have updates on the fall workday posted on our Facebook page as the date approaches, if you are available and willing, we will start at 8:00am and I'll make sure there's plenty of water and snacks to keep us going!

NEXT STEPS



SPOTLIGHT ON BETTY

For 30 years, home was a small island in the Potomac

Fuquas lived a half-mile offshore in the 7th District

Frank and Betty Fuqua lived on tiny Bullock Island in the Potomac River for 30 years. The driveway to the house was a half-mile passage on a boat across St. Catherine Sound from St. Mary's County's 7th District.

Frank's father bought the island as a summer home during World War II when Frank was 12. A house was already on the island, brought in piece by piece by boat in 1934. In 1970, Frank returned, with Betty, to the place of his childhood summers to live year-round, and brought their three children, ages 15, 13 and 10 at the time. The kids had to cross the sound to meet the school bus, and the house was powered by a direct-current generator.



The Fuquas left their cars at any of the three public wharves serving St. Catherine Sound to get back to the 3-acre island. While Frank worked the water, Betty worked at Patuxent River Naval Air Station's Judge Advocate General's office as a legal technician, loving the job. Except the commute. "The only thing I didn't like about it was the commute. That first half-mile was heck," she said.

Hurricanes would lash the island and in cold winters, ice would encircle it preventing travel. Betty recalled trying to get to the mainland with her three children aboard the boat with her in a terrible fog. Frank advised her to keep the breeze at the left side of her face to reach the mainland. She did her best, but after a while the boat came across a pound net and she knew she was out in the Potomac River. She kept going, unable to see anything ahead. She then starting coming upon a waterfront house and called out. The person inside was frightened by hearing a voice come out of nowhere, she said. They drifted around for an hour before they got to where they were going. But living on Bullock Island had its advantages – solitude, peace and quiet.

As time went on, it just became too difficult to continue living on the island. And it was too easy to be forgotten out there, Betty said. Once Betty and the kids were stuck out on the island for three days before anyone noticed. The boat's propeller wasn't working.

The Fuquas moved from the island to Budd's Creek in 2000. Their son, Ty, now takes care of the house on the island for them.

Message from the Treasurer, Bob Donaldson

The state of our union is good, and getting better. While our operating expenses still exceed our operating revenues, the trend is improving. Membership is up, pledges are up and it seems like our spirits are up too.

Maintaining our 288-year-old church, as well as the Parish Hall and Rectory is expensive. Things are constantly breaking and/or needing to be refurbished. Fortunately, we have an Endowment that is dedicated to the perpetual maintenance of the church. That endowment has allowed us to spend over \$200,000 on the refurbishment of the church interior and replacement 2 of the 3 HVAC systems over the last 5 years. However, the endowment alone is not enough.

The next major project that needs to be done is replacing the discolored plexiglass that covers and protects the exterior of our beautiful stained-glass windows. The Vestry has voted to proceed with a proposal, from Washington Art Glass, to remove the plexiglass, scrape, repair, prime and paint the exterior of the stained-glass windows. They will then build custom white aluminum frames to hold clear laminated-glass windows. This is the same glass used in car windshields, so it will never discolor.

The project will cost approximately \$48,500. We have been planning this for a couple of years and have allocated about \$25,000 from previous donations and are now embarking on a fundraising drive from now until April 30th , to raise another \$25,000. We have already received a number of significant pledges from some very generous parishioners and are now asking anyone who would like to contribute to this project to contact me or send a check to the parish office marked for the "Stained Glass Window Fund". Thank you in advance for any contribution you are able to make.

EASTER EGG HUNT : SUNDAY MARCH 31ST

Immediately after Rite ii (10:00 a.m.) Service, Weather Permitting


