



# The Chaptico Church Cookbook

We love to eat and we are blessed to have so many amazing and talented cooks in our parish. From time to time we will feature some recipes from our cookbook.

Since Labor Day marks the end of summer, here are two salad recipes for your cookout.

## Summertime Macaroni Salad

|-------------------------------------|-----------------------------|
| 1 (8 oz.) pkg. elbow macaroni       | 1/2 c. sour cream           |
| 1 c. diced, unpared cucumbers       | 1/4 c. milk                 |
| 1/2 c. diced green pepper           | 1 1/4 tsp. salt             |
| 1/4 c. sweet pickle relish          | Dash of pepper              |
| 1 T. grated onion                   | 2 hard-cooked eggs, chopped |
| 1/2 c. mayonnaise or salad dressing |                             |

Cook macaroni as package label directs. Drain; rinse with cold water. Place in large bowl. Add cucumber, green pepper, pickle relish and grated onion; mix well. In small bowl, combine mayonnaise, sour cream, milk, salt and pepper; blend well. Toss until macaroni is well coated. Gently mix in chopped eggs. Refrigerate, covered, until well chilled, several hours or overnight. Garnish with green pepper strips. Yield: 10 to 12 servings.

## BLT in a Bowl

| 1 head romaine lettuce  | 1 pt. cherry tomatoes    |
| 1 head iceberg lettuce  | 1/2 lb. Jarlsberg cheese |
| 1/2 c. slivered almonds | 1/4 c. Parmesan cheese   |
| 1/2 lb. bacon           | 1/2 c. croutons          |
| <b>DRESSING:</b>        | 1 lg. garlic clove       |
| 1 med. lemon (3 T.)     | 3/4 c. vegetable oil     |

Toast almonds at 300° for 12 to 15 minutes. Chop and fry bacon. Clean lettuces and chop in bite-size pieces. Mix first 7 ingredients.

**Dressing:** Mix garlic and juice together; whisk in oil slowly.

Toss salad ingredients with dressing just before serving. Add croutons, and serve. Yield: 20 servings.

**Variation:** Can use Swiss cheese instead of Jarlsberg cheese.

## REFLECTIONS ON THIS SUNDAY'S READINGS

(SEPTEMBER 6, 2020) —THE 14<sup>TH</sup> SUNDAY AFTER PENTECOST (PROPER 18, YEAR A)

Welcome to Christ Church. We now reach a section of Matthew's Gospel in which Jesus teaches about God's way of dealing with humanity: namely, forgiveness. Today's reading is primarily concerned with the Church's role as the agent of forgiveness. Even when a member of the Church is unrepentant, the Church is not to give up on that person easily. We are to make every effort to move the sinner to repent and accept the forgiveness of God, which Jesus has commissioned the Church to offer.

The story of Moses and the Exodus continues today. God and the Egyptian king have been in a struggle. Now comes the final test. We hear the instructions to the Israelites about the meal that will protect them from Egypt's final plague and prepare them to set forth on their journey to freedom. This became the Passover meal of the Jews, the precursor of the Eucharistic meal.

Today's passage from the Epistle to the Romans continues to deal with the characteristics of Christian living. We are to live in good relationships with all people, to respect the laws and authorities of human society, and above all to express love by mutual behavior based on God's law.

We gather as the People of God, having found in our relationship with God that as he saved Israel from slavery, he is the lover and savior of all people. We find in our lives together as Church that we are not only the recipients of God's love and forgiveness but we are also sent into the world as the instruments of that love to all people.

### The Feast of Constance and Her Companions: The Martyrs of Memphis

On September 9, the Episcopal Church celebrates the witness of Constance and her companions, remembered along with other faithful Christians as the Martyrs of Memphis.

Yellow fever, a mosquito-borne illness that frequently affected the American South during the late 19<sup>th</sup> century, had reached an epidemic status in August 1878. Memphis, Tennessee, on the banks of the Mississippi River, had been afflicted by the disease several times before, leading citizens to flee the city en masse at the earliest signs of an outbreak. More than half of the city's population left, leaving more than 20,000 people behind. According to *A Great Cloud of Witnesses*, "As cases multiplied, death tolls averaged 200 daily. When the worst was over, ninety percent of the people who remained had contracted the fever; more than 5,000 people had died."

Faithful Episcopalians and other Christians remained behind in the stifling heat to serve the city in its crisis. Chief among these saints were Constance, the Superior of the Sisters of St. Mary, and several other sisters of the order, who had come to Memphis some years earlier to found a girls' school at St. Mary's Episcopal Cathedral. The cathedral was located in the thick of the yellow fever epidemic, which provided ample opportunity to minister to the afflicted. They tended the sick, gave rest to the weary, soothed the suffering, and blessed the dying, making a special effort to find and take care of the numerous orphaned children of Memphis.

Constance and her companions knew well the danger and destruction that the fever represented, but would not be deterred from serving God and neighbor in that place. By the end of September, four of the sisters, along with two Episcopal priests and many unnamed volunteers, had succumbed to the fever: Sister Constance, Sister Thecla, Sister Ruth, Sister Frances, the Rev. Louis Schuyler and the Rev. Charles Parsons. Sister Constance's last words, uttered when she was no longer physically able to serve, are enshrined in the altar at St. Mary's Cathedral: "Alleluia! Osanna!"

#### Collect for Constance and Her Companions

We give you thanks and praise, O God of compassion, for the heroic witness of Constance and her companions, who, in a time of plague and pestilence, were steadfast in their care for the sick and dying, and loved not their own lives, even unto death; Inspire in us a like love and commitment to those in need, following the example of our Savior Jesus Christ; who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, now and for ever. Amen.
