SUNDAY THEMES IN EASTERTIDE

Certain scriptural themes which highlight the meaning of the resurrection have been part of the Church's tradition for many centuries.

THE SUNDAY AFTER EASTER DAY (the Second Sunday of Easter) always has as its Gospel reading the risen Lord's appearance to Thomas. The theme is, of course, not "Doubting Thomas," but Thomas' outburst of praise in which Jesus is first recognized as God ("My Lord and my God!" he said), and Jesus' words about us: "Blessed are those who have not seen and yet believe."

THE THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER always gives an account of a resurrection appearance in which Jesus eats with his friends. Its significance for Christians lies in its Eucharistic pattern. It was in the breaking of bread that Jesus was first recognized after his resurrection. It is in the breaking of bread in Eucharist that we encounter our risen Lord now; thus our response at that point in the liturgy: "Alleluia. Christ our Passover is sacrificed for us. Therefore let us keep the feast. Alleluia."

THE FOURTH SUNDAY is called "Good Shepherd Sunday" because its Gospel reading always reflects Jesus' relationship to us in the image of the Shepherd: he who knows us each by name, who provides for our needs, who saves us from evil, and who guides us into new life.

THE FIFTH SUNDAY has readings in which prior to the crucifixion, Jesus foretold the results of his death for the future life of his followers. In Year A his death will make him the way for us into eternal life: "I am the way and the truth and the life." In Year B, his death will prepare the way for us to receive the Holy Spirit who will bind us into his life. In Year C, his death as the ultimate expression of his love, will give us the model for Christian living: to love one another as he loved us.

THE SIXTH SUNDAY'S Gospel reading has Jesus describing the results of our new life in him. Year A describes that life as a union as intimate as that between a vine and its branches: the branches draw their life from the vine. Year B reveals that the new life of divine love that we have received makes us no longer simply servants of God but the friends of God. In Year C, we hear his promise that the Holy Spirit will be the source of our continued life in him and will be our Counselor.










On the following Thursday, following Luke's chronology for our Lord's **ASCENSION** to the Father on the fortieth day after the resurrection, we celebrate that event. This is not an event separate from the resurrection but one of the three parts of that one event: rising, ascending, and giving the Spirit.

On the **SEVENTH SUNDAY**, the Sunday after Ascension Day, we hear each year a different portion of the "high priestly prayer," the prayer Jesus prayed on the night before his death for us: that the glory he has received from the Father may be given to us (Year A); that under the Father's protection we may have unity and be witnesses to the truth (Year B); that our unity with each other in the Father and the Son may be a witness to the world (Year C).

Finally, the season of Easter is completed on the **DAY OF PENTECOST OR WHITSUNDAY**. This celebrates the third action of Christ's victory over death: the gift of the Holy Spirit to the Church. The second reading from Acts shows the disciples waiting for God to reach out to them. Their waiting is rewarded by the coming of the Holy Spirit, which makes it possible for them to speak the Good News in the languages of all peoples. God now is the source of reuniting the human race in Christ by the power of the Holy Spirit.

The Gospel reading reveals that through the Holy Spirit we become the means for Jesus' ministry to continue. In receiving his peace we become the instruments of that peace to the world. On this day, the full results of redemption in the risen Lord come to light and are the cause of our celebration. In response, we keep this day as a baptismal day, and even if there are no candidates to be baptized, we renew our baptismal vows.

REFLECTIONS ON THIS SUNDAY'S READINGS THE SECOND SUNDAY OF EASTER—YEAR C



This Sunday we begin the second of the seven weeks of our celebration of Christ's resurrection. This Sunday is always the time we hear the story of Jesus' appearance to his disciples on Easter Day and then again on the following Sunday when Thomas (who had been absent the previous week) refused to believe them unless he saw the Lord with his own eyes and touched the scars from his crucifixion.

This account is packed with the signs of resurrection that still find expression in the liturgy and the life of the church. The Lord's greeting, "Peace be with you," is characteristic of most of his risen appearances. The gospel writers' care in noting that these appearances were on the first day of the week reflects the early Church's decision to move the day of worship to Sun-

day. Not only do the apostles see the risen Lord but also he gives the Holy Spirit to them, marking Sunday as the Spirit's day. Above all, he passes on to them the power he received from his Father: the authority to forgive sins.

The other readings today are two different sorts of witness to the meaning of the resurrection: the first, from Acts, is Peter's sermon about the resurrection when he is on trial before the council after being arrested for the very same sort of preaching he does here. John's vision of the last days, in the Book of Revelation, begins with the salutation from the risen Lord who has made us his royal priesthood and the servants of God.

Our celebration of Christ's victory over sin and death has only begun. Week after week, we will explore more deeply our new life as the baptized people of God. Week after week, the Lord will reveal himself to us in the breaking of the bread.

April 28, 2019 – Easter 2 (C) The Feast of St. Catherine of Siena

Tomorrow the church celebrates the Feast of Catherine of Siena, a fourteenth-century mystic and spiritual writer.

Caterina Benincasa was born in Siena, Italy, in 1347 and experienced her first religious vision when she was only 6 years old. *Holy Women*, *Holy Men* describes how, as she was walking along the road one day, Catherine looked up and "beheld our Lord seated in glory with St. Peter, St. Paul, and St. John" and in her vision "the Savior smiled on her and blessed her."

Despite her family's objections, at the age of 16 she joined the Third Order of the Dominicans and spent her early life serving the poor and converting sinners, according to *An Episcopal Dictionary of the Church: A User Friendly Reference for Episcopalians*, edited by Don S. Armentrout and Robert Boak Slocum.

Catherine worked courageously to help the ill during the black plague and visited prisoners condemned to death. She also arbitrated feuds and attempted to help restore the schism in the church at that time between the popes in Rome and Avignon by writing letters to political leaders and traveling to plead for unification in person.

Holy Women, Holy Men explains that, in Siena, opinion about Catherine was sharply divided as to whether she was a saint or a fanatic (p. 350), but she eventually won the full support from the Dominican Mother House.

In 1377-1378 Catherine wrote her famous, mystical *Dialogue*, which she dictated to her secretaries while in an ecstatic state. Here is one of its better-known passages:

"You are rewarded not according to time or work, but according to the measure of your love. Many are placed in their childhood to work in the vineyard; some enter later in life, and others in old age; sometimes these latter labor with such fire of love, seeing the shortness of the time, that they rejoin those who entered in their childhood, because they have advanced but slowly. By love of obedience, then, does the soul receive her merit, filling the vessel of her heart."

Catherine died in Rome on April 29, 1380, at the age of 33, and became a saint in 1461, canonized by Pope Pius II.

Collect for Catherine of Siena

Everlasting God, you so kindled the flame of holy love in the heart of blessed Catherine of Siena, as she meditated on the passion of your Son our Savior, that she devoted her life to the poor and the sick, and to the peace and unity of the Church: Grant that we also may share in the mystery of Christ's death, and rejoice in the revelation of his glory; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.




